Obituary

This union produced two sons, Arturo and Kermit. She was employed by the Cleveland Metropolitan Public Schools from 1959 to 1987 where she was loved by all her students.

Joan loved to travel, meet people and experience different cultures. She vacationed in the Caribbean, Europe and Canada. In 1987 she went to Mogadishu, Somalia in East Africa to visit her son who was there doing development work for the relief organization Africare. While in Mogadishu she volunteered at the American School as a tutor. That showed Joan's total dedication to the education of children. Before returning to the United States she spent some time traveling in Kenya.

Joan returned to Cleveland and continued her passion, teaching with the Cleveland Public Schools until retiring in 1999. Joan had a gift for reaching children. There was not a place she would go without being recognized by a former student as their favorite teacher and the influence she made in their lives. She touched many lives in Cleveland. She will be missed by many and forgotten by none.
