## Obituary

Barbara Tolliver (Tolbert) and her siblings were born in Clarksdale, MS. Her mother Willoughby Tolliver (Willie B) was the daughter of WWI military Veteran Acy Tolliver. Six years later her mother would relocate the family to Cleveland, Ohio, following the brutal lynch and murder of 14 year old Emmett Till, which occurred less than fifty miles from where she was raising her toddlers.

In Cleveland, Ohio Barbara would grow up in a loving family that consisted of her eight siblings from Mississippi, her grandmother Adell Tolliver, grandfather Acy Tolliver, and Aunt Helen and her children. The family made sure they stayed together by frequently renting large duplex homes until they could afford to purchase a home big enough to house them all.

Soon the family would experience additional growth as Madea gave birth to another daughter, son and a set of twin girls, bringing the total number of children to thirteen. Barbara seemed to cherish the idea of being the seventh of 13 children, perhaps reasoning that as a middle child, it allowed her to chart her own course, develop hobbies and habits that the others were too young to pursue and the older siblings too busy to investigate. Within that context she became a unique sister to everyone. She exhibited our mother's determination, and an independence that served all her pursuits.

Barbara gave birth to three children Lakitha (Tolliver) Tolbert, Arzell (Tolliver) Tolbert and Jermaine (Tolliver) Tolbert. She adopted two daughters Angelique (Tolliver) Tolbert and Tatiana (Tolliver) Tolbert and she has five grandchildren Donte, Kajonna, Octavia, Daylon, Dahlya and Zariya Simone Tolbert-Hill.

Barbara graduated from East High School in 1968. Barbara was as volunteer for the Cleveland Board of Education –Division of Early Childhood Education of the Cleveland Public Schools.

Barbara enjoyed putting together puzzles, she found that doing jigsaw puzzles improved cognition and visual-spatial reasoning. Puzzles required concentration and improves short term memory and problem solving, she wore the title "Puzzle Lady" proudly.

Our sister was a homemaker who loved to cook, and bake, her favorite was chocolate chip cookies. She also loved clipping coupons and using those coupons to shop enjoying the bargains that she was able to take advantage of and was given the name "Coupon Queen", by her siblings and those who knew her.
