Janie was well known for her spirit of hospitality, and she opened her home to anyone in need. Janie's house was often the place for not only comfort, but for gatherings where there was food, laughter, and good times. Her home continued to be a place for gatherings at holidays and Sunday dinners for years, extending to her grandchildren and greatgrandchildren.
